## **Winter Fashion**

I she attitude of shoppers at Keeneland's January sale is any indication, the future is so bright we all ought to be wearing shades. The mixed auction usually has the atmosphere of an after-Christmas clearance event, with consignors trying to find new homes for their leftovers from more prestigious sales. But buyers fought over the equine equivalents of leans and T-shirts like they were designer dresses. As a result,

the auction generated one of the largest grosses in its history, \$53,418,000, during a six-day run (Jan. 10-15) in Lexington even though the catalogue lacked a major dispersal to spice up the bidding.

The commercial horse business has been on an upswing since the summer of 2003, and many people are betting the surge will last a lot longer because of a variety of factors, including positive publicity from the Funny Cide and Smarty Jones Triple Crown campaigns and the prospects for slot machines at racetracks in more states.

"We think the horse business is going in the right direction, and we're counting on it continuing; it's time for us to grow," said Utah horseman Lance Robinson. Buying in

the name of Gulf Coast Farm, he and partners Jerry Bailey (a Florida pinhooker) and Jeff Collett (an investment consultant from Utah) were the sale's biggest spenders, paying \$3.417,000 for 19 head.

Jody Huckabay of Elm Tree Farm in Kentucky consigned horses and also was trying to buy. But as of the afternoon of the auction's fourth day, he hadn't won a single bidding battle.

"I don't know where they're coming from, but there are lots of people here with tons of money, and everybody is optimistic," Huckabay said. "Horses that we want are bringing nearly double what we're willing to pay."

With buyer enthusiasm riding so high, Keeneland was able to sell significantly more horses than in January of 2004 while keeping the average and median prices impressively high. The key auction trends were as follows:

- The number sold rose 8.2%, from 1,258 last year to 1,361 this year.
- The gross grew 8.3% from \$49,344,900.
- The average advanced less than 1%, from \$39,225 to \$39,249.
- The median remained the same at \$13,000.
- The buy-back rate increased slightly, from 21.4% to 22.9%.

The number sold reached its secondhighest total ever, threatening to eclipse the record of 1,381 set in 1991. Meanwhile, the median equaled its second-highest level ever, based on Keeneland records dating back to 1989 and The Blood-Horse's figures, which go back to the mid-1980s. The auction's peak of \$14,000 was achieved in 2000.

However, Keeneland and The Blood-Horse do not agree about where other figures rank. According to The Blood-Horse, which does not include the Nelson Bunker Hunt dispersal of 1988 in Keeneland January sale statistics. the 2005 gross is the

auction's second-highest ever, falling short of 2000's record of \$60,937,500, and the average is the third-highest ever. Keeneland ranks this year's gross as the third-highest and the average as the fourth-highest.

But while the numbers' standing in a historical perspective was in dispute, nearly everyone agreed that they were encouraging.

"In general, the sale was very strong," said Geoffrey Russell, Keeneland's director of sales. "Confidence has returned to the breeding market, which 2001 dampened (with mare reproductive loss syndrome and the 9/11 terrorist attacks). Everybody I've talked to is very happy. Buyers are having a hard time buying, and the sellers are enjoying selling."

The number of horses sold for individual prices of \$500,000 or more remained about the same, slipping from 11 last year to 10 this year while the number sold for \$1 mil-

"It sure seems like there are a lot of people who want to be in the horse business right now," said Brent Fernung, the general manager of Cloverleaf Farms II in Florida. "The catalogue is kind of weak, but the nice horses are selling awfully well. Whenever they bring in one that looks any good at all, you can't hardly see it standing out back here (in the walking ring) because of all the buyers surrounding it. It's hard to find a horse that makes some sense from a price
